I have been in Minnesota since I was five years old, transplanted from southern Wisconsin. Shortly after moving to Rochester, my parents had this idea of buying a farm and playing farmer on the weekends. It was an interesting experience since both my parents grew up as city kids. We bought 80 acres west of Rochester and before long we were raising corn, soybeans, oats, alfalfa, cows, chickens, dogs, horses and sheep. We had upwards of 50 sheep and 12 horses at various times. I did get comfortable on horses like one of our other MAPE members wrote earlier. I showed horses regularly as a kid and went

to the state 4H horse show a few times. I met my future wife at this time and when we rode ponies together when I was 7 or 8. We started dating in college.

I credit my love of the outdoors to my early time on the farm, being in Boy Scouts and early church trips to the Boundary Waters Canoe Area. Those experiences gave me the bug to travel to many national parks across the lower 48. Minnesota IT Services (MNIT) was formed during the IT consolidation 10 years ago. Today, I find myself part of MNIT instead of the DNR, but I am still on the web team.

**Fun fact:** I am skilled at riding on three wheels and have been riding Honda three-wheelers since 1981. My trail rider is a Honda 350X. I also buy and sell Honda three-wheelers, buying them to fix up and sell or sell parts from. I also have a couple of soon to be vintage snowmobiles and early Jet Skis. # MAPE members ratify memorandum of understanding incorporating earned sick and safe time law into contract

MAPE members last month ratified a memorandum of understanding (MOU) that incorporates the earned sick and safe time (ESST) law into the MAPE contract.

The ESST law allows MAPE employees previously prohibited from accruing sick and safe time due to classification status to earn one hour of sick leave for every 30 hours worked, up to a maximum of 48 hours earned in a year.



Employees can use ESST for reasons such as:

- 1. the employee's mental or physical illness, treatment or preventive care;
- 2. a family member's mental or physical illness, treatment or preventive care;
- 3. absence due to domestic abuse, sexual assault or stalking of the employee or a family member;
- 4. closure of the employee's workplace due to weather or public emergency or closure of a family member's school or care facility due to weather or public emergency; and
- 5. when determined by a health authority or health care professional that the employee or a family member is at risk of infecting others with a communicable disease.

In addition, the ESST law allows sick and safe time to be used for family members, including children, spouses and grandparents. A complete list of family members can be found at the DLI <u>Earned Sick and Safe Time (ESST) webpage</u>.

Our MAPE Local 101 members play a pivotal role in the ESST law, including overseeing, promoting and enforcing the law for employees statewide.
